MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome to yet another glorious summer in Vermont! Much is happening around the lake at this time of year. Here are a few of the highlights:

Lake Wise Gold

We are proud to report Lake Iroquois is only the third lake in the state of Vermont to receive the coveted Gold Lake Wise Award! To achieve this milestone, 15% of lakeshore owners around the lake must be recipients of the Lake Wise Award. We anticipate formal recognition of the achievement and awarding of the special sign symbolizing this achievement at our Annual Meeting to be held on Wednesday, July 19th from 5:30-7:30 at Chris Conant's camp at 744 Beebe Lane, Williston, Vermont. Beebe Lane Stormwater Improvement Project

We are excited to report receipt of a \$320,000 Congressionally Directed Spending grant for FY23 in coordination with Senator Bernie Sanders' office on behalf of the Lake Iroquois Recreation District (LIRD). As reported in the Fall 2022 newsletter, we worked with LIRD to apply for and receive a \$50,000 matching grant toward the Beebe Lane Stormwater Improvements project. These implementation grants will fund needed improvements that address poor road design, which contributes to flooding and to the degradation of water quality from erosion and pollutant runoff into the lake. The upgrade in road conditions will also improve access to the beach and to the hiking trails around the lake. *Aquatic Invasive Species Management*

As part of our continued efforts geared towards early detection, we have an aquatic plant survey scheduled for early June. We urge you to keep a look out when you are around and on the lake and report any sightings of suspected milfoil or cyanobacteria (blue-green algae blooms). Just go to our website to file a report: <u>https://www.lakeiroquois.org/help/report-invasives</u>. We would also like to add that hand pulling is supported and highly encouraged by the Lake Iroquois Association and the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation (VT DEC). Let us know if you find milfoil near your property that you hand pull so we can track this activity and keep a watch on the area.

LIRD 2023 SEASON-THE BEACH IS OPEN!

The Lake Iroquois Recreation District is a municipal entity established to manage and protect the recreational assets of Lake Iroquois. The district covers 150 acres of open land from Williston Road to the public beach, including Beebe Lane, the public beach, playground, and walking trails. The beach is open from Memorial Day to Labor Day. There is a fee (cash or checks accepted) to use the beach which is paid at the kiosk at the beach.

LAKE IROQUOIS PUBLIC BOAT LAUNCH GREETER PROGRAM

The LIA Summer 2023 greeter staff is trained and looking forward to meeting you!

Our role is to help educate boaters at Lake Iroquois about Aquatic Invasive Species and how boaters can take simple steps to help protect Lake Iroquois and other waterbodies in our region from their harmful effects. If you haven't been to Lake Iroquois recently, we welcome you to come and enjoy the Lake this summer! Eurasian watermilfoil has been largely remediated at the Lake, and the water clarity and health has vastly improved... it appears as healthy as it was over 20 years ago!

As a greeter team, we strive to serve you and the lake in as friendly and unobtrusive manner



as possible. Our greeters are available to provide free and quick boat hot water pressure washing services when appropriate to help protect the Lake from the spread of invasive aquatic species, whether it be harmful invasive plants, zebra mussels, spiny water fleas, etc. The temperature of the washer is 140 degrees which is able to kill invasive species without the use of any chemicals.

Boaters are encouraged to wash and dry their own boats, but many people don't realize that the VT Dept. of Environmental Conservation recommends that boats be washed and then kept dry for a **minimum of 5 DAYS** in order to adequately prevent the spread of invasive species. When leaving Lake Iroquois, if you know that you intend to enjoy another water body in the near future, we are more than glad to pressure wash your craft on your way out! No CHARGE!

We staff the hot water pressure washer every weekend from Memorial Day through Labor Day, including holiday's. We are open Friday's from 12:30pm to 6:30pm, and weekends and holiday's from 6:30am to 6:30pm.

We hope that you enjoy the beauty of Lake Iroquois this summer! Thank you for your assistance and partnership in protecting Vermont's wonderful public waters.
